VISTA Assignment Objectives & Member Activities

Host Site Organization Overview	Maine Foodscapes focuses on reducing food insecurity by providing low-income families and individuals with free gardens, gardening, and food preparation instruction, and a community experience based on shared desires to increase direct access to healthy, nutritious produce. Maine Foodscapes also participates in the network of southern Maine organizations and programs concerned with producing food to reduce food insecurity and has developed partnerships with several other organizations that enable us to leverage additional resources to combat hunger and poverty throughout Southern Maine. Because organic vegetable gardening embodies the principles of sustainable agriculture, reduces the transportation component of food costs, and improves the micro-ecology in the area where the garden is located, the Free Garden Project also generates positive outcomes for the environment.
Project Goal	The AmeriCorps Summer Associate(s) at Maine Foodscapes will support the Garden Project by expanding its seasonal gardener support. The Garden Project partners with Gardeners experiencing poverty in Cumberland, York, and parts of Androscoggin and Oxford Counties. Summer Associates will recruit volunteers for Gardener mentorship, coordinate succession seeds and seedlings distribution to gardeners, establish the first annual Foodscapes plant sale fundraiser, develop mid-season surveys for program participants and partners, and develop e-News campaigns to send digitally to Gardeners which include seasonal tips and tricks for growing fruits and vegetables organically at home.
Sustainability	The work of the team of Foodscapes Summer Associates will support the sustainability of the Garden Project by developing procedures for expanding support to Low-Income Gardeners during the growing season. The Associate positions are designed to augment the full year member's term that will work on data management and volunteer programming. The projects that the Associates work on will be expanded upon in the rest of the year and the following summer.
Project	Project Summer Associate(s) will support the Foodscapes Garden Project which provides gardens and gardening resources to low-income Mainers throughout Southern Maine.

	Following federal, state, and organizational guidelines that address health and safety within the context of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Associates will assist in the distribution of gardening resources and partnering volunteer Garden Mentors with families that are new to gardening. This project will support the full year member's volunteer recruitment and management activities on their VAD.
Member Activities	1. The Summer Associate will work with the Garden Project Coordinator to recruit and train volunteer Garden Mentors.
	2. The Summer Associate will work with the Garden Project Coordinator to distribute succession seeds and seedlings to 1 st and 2 nd year program participants throughout Cumberland County, Androscoggin County, and York County.
	3. The Summer Associate will use MailChimp to create e-Newsletter campaigns to send to low-income gardeners that include tips and tricks for organic fruit and vegetable gardening at home.
	4. The Summer Associate will plan one Foodscapes Plant Sale Fundraiser.
	5. The Summer Associate will develop a Mid-Season Survey for Garden Project participants.

AmeriCorps Prohibited Activities

The following activities are prohibited in AmeriCorps Programs:

(a) While charging time to the AmeriCorps program, accumulating service or training hours, or otherwise performing activities supported by the AmeriCorps program or CNCS, staff and members may not engage in the following activities:

1. Attempting to influence legislation;
2. Organizing or engaging in protests, petitions, boycotts, or strikes;
3. Assisting, promoting, or deterring union organizing;
4. Impairing existing contracts for services or collective bargaining agreements;
5. Engaging in partisan political activities, or other activities designed to influence the outcome of an election to any public office;
6. Participating in, or endorsing, events or activities that are likely to include advocacy for or against political parties, political platforms, political candidates, proposed legislation, or elected officials;
7. Engaging in religious instruction, conducting worship services, providing instruction as part of a program that includes mandatory religious instruction or worship, constructing or operating facilities devoted to religious instruction or worship, maintaining facilities primarily or inherently devoted to religious instruction or worship, or engaging in any form of religious proselytization;
8. Providing a direct benefit to—
 - i. A business organized for profit;
 - ii. A labor union;
 - iii. A partisan political organization;
 - iv. A nonprofit organization that fails to comply with the restrictions contained in section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 except that nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent participants from engaging in advocacy activities undertaken at their own initiative; and engaging in advocacy activities undertaken at their own initiative; and
 - v. An organization engaged in the religious activities described in paragraph (g) of this section, unless Corporation assistance is not used to support those religious activities;
9. Conducting a voter registration drive or using Corporation funds to conduct a voter registration drive;
10. Providing abortion services or referrals for receipt of such services; and

11. Such other activities as CNCS may prohibit
